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Preface

Previous Studies

The *editio princeps* of the composition listed in Laroche's *Catalogue des textes hittites* under no. 446—a purification ritual for a house invoking the Ancient Gods—was published in 1961 by Heinrich Otten in the article “Eine Beschwörung der Unterirdischen aus Boğazköy” (ZA 54), with German translation and philological commentary. No complete and updated text editions of the ritual have been published since. Otten could rely on three well-preserved copies of the ritual for his edition. Afterward, more minor fragments of the same copies, and new ones belonging to other tablets, were retrieved in the excavations at Hattuša and published in the various autography series. These new materials have been included in more recent translations of the text (without transcriptions), published by Billie Jean Collins (1997, in English), and more recently Jared Miller (2008, German; additional notes in 2010). Heike Peter (2004) published an edition that includes a transcription and a commentary on the content, but the work closely follows the first publication by Otten and does not include other available manuscripts. An important fragment (AnAr 21626), which fills in the beginning and end of the ritual in tablet B, was published with a learned commentary in Akdoğan and Wilhelm 2003.

Other studies have been dedicated to the interesting content of this ritual, in particular its mythological and religious-cultural background, and its formal and narrative components. From a comparative perspective, Gerd Steiner (1971) and Mary Bachvarova (2006; 2016, 95–108) have pointed out distinctive parallels in content and textual-narrative patterns with archaic Greek literary compositions, specifically Homeric epic and Attic tragedy. Gernot Wilhelm discussed this text at some length in a contribution on the conceptions of purity in Anatolia and the ancient Near East (1999), and in another work dealing with the conceptual connection between ancestor cult and the theology of the Netherworld in a Hurrian-Hittite context (2009).

Content Overview

The present study provides an updated philological edition of the ritual CTH 446 with transliteration and English translation. The texts of all available manuscripts are presented in parallel with a scored transliteration and a composite transcription. Following the publication standards of the Hethitologie Portal

Mainz (HPM), the transcription is arranged and numbered according to syntactical units, or *kola*. The line numbers cited in this volume for the text under consideration refer to these *kola*. A concordance between the univocal line numbering of this edition and each manuscript can be retrieved through the tablet synopsis provided on pp. 233. A glossary to the text can be found at the end of the volume.

In addition to the updated critical edition, this work aims to provide a comprehensive study of this ritual text. Chapters 1 and 2 introduce the texts' manuscripts and content. Chapter 1 discusses the paleography and chronology of the manuscripts, while chapter 2 discusses the conception of purity and the techniques of purification in Hittite rituals (ch. 2.1), the role of the Netherworld gods (ch. 2.2), the composite historical-cultural and religious background of the text (ch. 2.3), and includes an overview of the text's structure and content (ch. 2.4–5).

Chapter 3 presents the critical text edition proper, followed by a detailed philological commentary, with a line by line discussion of problematic aspects of content and unclear passages. Chapters 4–6 aim at defining the nature and scope of the purification ritual, and the context of its creation; they also review previous interpretations of this complex composition.

Chapter 4 surveys ritual texts of various typologies, and shows that CTH 446 shares a number of elements of content, practice, and form with several other ritual texts of similar scope and goals. These considerations are relevant to the discussion in the following chapters, which investigate the nature and origins of this composition against the broader background of the Hittite ritual corpus.

Chapter 5 analyzes the structure and content of CTH 446 in order to verify whether the text was created on the basis of written models, and, more precisely, compiled from separate self-standing ritual texts. This possibility has been suggested in previous studies on the basis of logical inconsistencies in the ritual procedure and other textual peculiarities (e.g., Wilhelm 1999; Miller 2008).

Chapter 6 explores another aspect of the problem of the nature of CTH 446 in discussing whether this ritual, in light of its elaborate compositional characteristics, can be considered a literary text as opposed to a text whose primary goal was actual ritual performance (as suggested, e.g., by Trémouille 2004, 168).

The core of the present work derives from my MA thesis, written under the supervision of Mauro Giorgieri and Clelia Mora (University of Pavia, 2012). I am particularly indebted to Professor Giorgieri for the preparation of the original text edition. In subsequent years I had the opportunity to review the text edition, in particular during an individual course with Lorenzo d'Alfonso during my doctoral study at the ISAW of New York University. I thank him for supporting this project and for having followed closely the writing process of the volume;

I also thank Professors Beate Pongratz-Leisten and Daniel Fleming for reading multiple drafts and providing insightful feedback during the process. The text edition was completed at the Department of Ancient Near Eastern Studies at the Julius-Maximilians-Universität in Würzburg (Germany), where I was kindly hosted for a period of research in Spring 2018. There, I was able to read and discuss in depth the ritual during a seminar course with Daniel Schwemer. I thank him for his invaluable advice during the review of the entire work. Finally, I thank Billie Jean Collins wholeheartedly, for she immediately took interest in this work when I inquired for publishing the volume with Lockwood Press and helped immensely with careful review of the whole work. I am also indebted to the useful advice and feedback of an anonymous reviewer, who read the draft of this work before its publication.

Parts of this work were presented in various forms at workshops and conferences in the United States: in particular, a separate study on the variants and errors of the manuscripts of CTH 446 was presented as a self-standing paper at the Tenth International Congress of Hittitology in Chicago (August–September 2017) and will be published in the forthcoming acts of the congress.
